HISTORY OF THE SITE

- Burnham Beeches was built in the 1930s by Alfred Nicholas, founder of the Nicholas Aspro empire.
- The property operated as a hotel from the early 1980s to 1992, when it was closed, and the building was stripped of its fittings for proposed renovations to convert it
- The renovations never took place and the mansion has since fallen into disrepair.
- The property was bought in 1998 by developers Lustig and Moar, who planned to refurbish the building and set up a health club on the estate, but the plans did not
- A four-person consortium had planned to buy the site and convert it into agedcare accommodation in 2001 but the sale did not go through.
- Another group bought the site in 2002 for aged-care accommodation, but that also fell through.
- The Shire of Yarra Ranges approved the redevelopment of the site in 2005 as a
